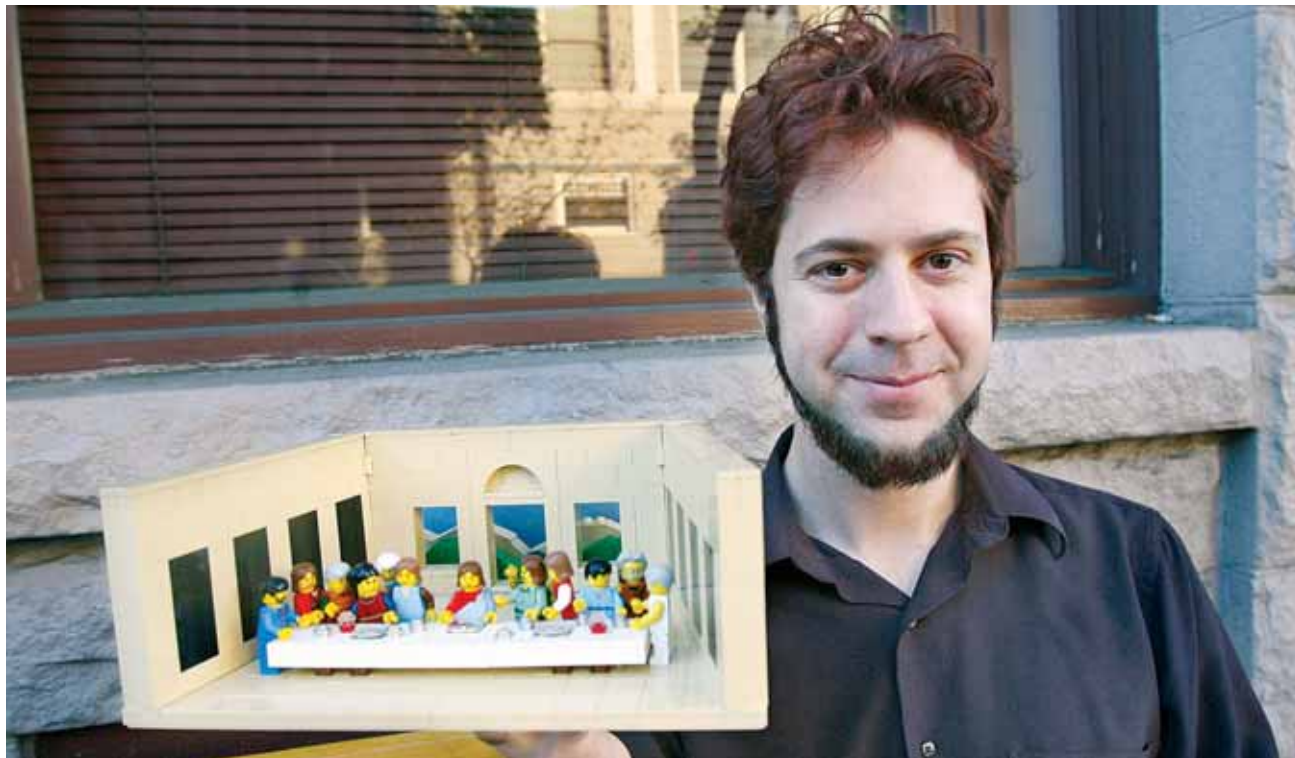

In the beginning, a tiny Lego Adam and Eve frolicked in a plastic Garden of Eden. Later, a fierce-looking Lego Moses held aloft a plastic Ten Commandments. Later still, a Lego Jesus and disciples gathered round a Lego table, sharing a Last Supper of plastic bread and wine.

Legos may not be the first thing that comes to mind for most people when they think of The Good Book — but for Mountain View resident Brendan Powell Smith, they're the Bible's building blocks. Six years ago, Smith, a 34-year-old Boston native, began using them to depict scenes from the Bible. Then he took photographs of those depictions, and soon was cataloguing and captioning them for the amusement of family and friends.

Six years later, Smith has

created a veritable Promised Land of Biblical scenes, all built entirely out of Legos, featuring the familiar plastic figurines and presented in sequence to tell the Bible's many stories. His Web site, www.thebricktestament.com, tells dozens of such stories, making it easy for viewers to click through the books of both Old and New Testament.

The result is both instructive and hilarious. From Genesis to Epistles, Smith's "Brick Testament" provides an unsparing look at the Bible's tales. (His ratings system warns viewers when the books contain nudity, violence, sex or cursing. Most contain at least one.) The scenes are extremely detailed, down to the clothing,

settings and expressions on the Lego-peoples' faces.

"It's a continual challenge to build a believable ancient setting for the stories out of plastic bricks, and photograph it all in a compelling way," Smith told the *Voice*.

Apparently he's succeeded, however, because Smith's work is becoming world-renowned.

The Brick Testament has been covered, or at least referenced, in dozens of magazines, newspapers and TV shows around the world, from *Time* magazine to *The Independent* of London to *The Daily Show* with Jon Stewart.

Although Smith describes himself as an atheist, he said he's been fascinated with the

study of religion since he was a philosophy and religion major at Boston University. Meanwhile, a few years back while browsing eBay, he rediscovered his childhood passion for Legos, and eventually thought of a way to combine the two interests. The

Brick Testament was born.

When Smith read the Bible during his studies, the book “was not at all what I had expected,” he said. “It made me realize that although many people in our society consider the Bible the most important book ever written and would go so far as to say they base their lives and their morality on it, only very few people ever bother to actually read the Bible themselves.”

For that reason, he says, “I

had in mind that it would be a greatly worthwhile thing if there was a way to spread the knowledge of the contents of the Bible to people in a way that was more fun than trudging through the actual ancient text, and yet still accurate to the scriptures.”

Smith, who moved to Mountain View eight years ago to be with his girlfriend, worked for many years as a Web site designer until launching the site, which he says received 20,000 hits in its first two weeks. Since that overnight success, Smith has attracted a publishing deal, and now works full-time as author and illustrator of a Brick Testament book series.

Each scene takes about one day to construct, Smith said. He estimates that he owns between 300 and 400 Lego sets, enough for the “basic bricks” of each scene. For special Legos not in his collection, he turns to www.bricklink.com or visits the “Pick-a-Brick” walls in nearby Lego stores.

“I put a lot of thought into the design of each Bible character, choosing from the thousands of possible combinations of Lego people parts,” he said.

Although most of the images stick with the story line, Smith does use some creative license, throwing in a modern-day joke now and then. In “The Teachings of Jesus,” for instance, a George W. Bush figure offers forgiveness to al Qaeda.

“There is something both amusing and disturbing at the same time about seeing these horrible acts carried out by smiling little plastic people,” Smith notes.

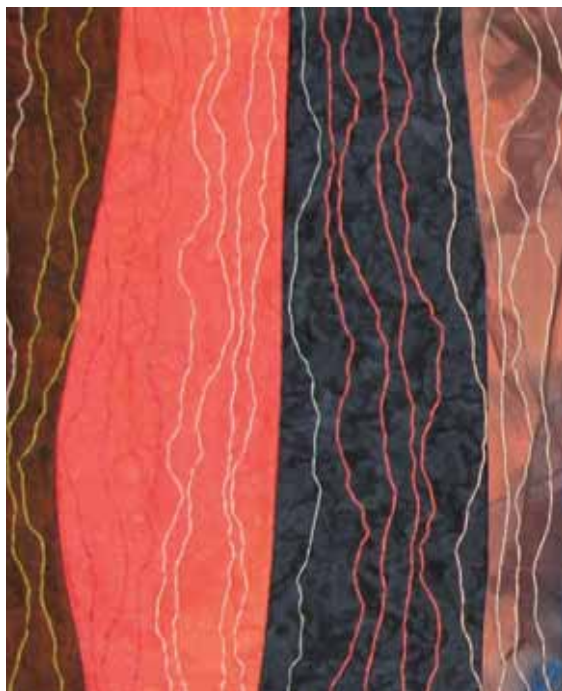
Currently, Smith has completed 313 books of the Bible, making his the largest illustrated Bible in the world. He says he receives many requests to use his material in classrooms, churches and Bible studies all over the world. This past spring, for example, he was invited to display some of his work at an art gallery opening in Bratislava, Slovakia.

Despite his obviously irreverent slant, “It is my hope that viewers leave The Brick Testament entertained and better informed,” he said.

“It is obviously not intended to be evangelical, but it is not necessarily anti-evangelical either. I leave it to individuals to make up their own minds about their religious beliefs, but I do think everyone is better off making informed decisions on the matter.”

Extreme quilting

TRIO OF ARTISTS ON DISPLAY AT CSMA DO AMAZING NEW THINGS WITH FABRIC AND THREAD

Colorful patches of cotton fabrics sewn together to form a blanket is what often defines a quilt, but in a current exhibit at the Community School of Music and Arts, three women have taken quilting to a whole new level.

The Mohr Gallery exhibit, "Surfaces and Layers," is a powerful presentation of fiber and textile art by Joan Schultze, Camille Ahern and Emily Stewart.

Their works show a rainbow of imported dyes decorating lusciously soft silk, and emit a feeling of euphoria and excitement. Scraps of photocopied Japanese letters and collaged junk mail express an artistic desire to capture fleeting moments in life.

For Joan Schultze, parallel lines of fabric connected by fine stitch-work pull together disparate elements. In "Late Rain 2," created in her San Francisco studio overlooking the city's skyscrapers, the work captures the urban sights and sounds — as well as some of the little pieces of papers that float around her work room everyday, even the junk mail, she said.

In effect, Schultze, a self-taught international fiber artist with work in the Smithsonian's National Museum of American Art, has turned the quotidian and mundane into an elegant quilted diary.

"My choices in creating a piece usually come from my travels and can be read as pages in a journal," she said. "I am enamored with surfaces and how they disintegrate over time. I layer

and scratch away to reveal what is beneath the surface, much like the effect one sees on old frescoes, illuminated manuscripts, and urban walls."

After spending 25 years as a high-tech manager in corporate America, Camille Ahern turned to silk painting and quilts. Several pieces of her work, including "Little Bang" and others from her "Oscillations" series, are on display.

Her work can create a phantasmagoric effect, as in "Spring," with its oscillating green colors pulsing behind brown-shaded tree trunks, while stitched flowers bud out of a ground that looks alive and moving. It's an abstraction of how one might feel walking through the woods and enjoying nature's beauty, she said.

Ahern likes to combine the malleability and fluidity of dyes on silk with the static and controlled fabrics of quilting.

"Dyes on silk produce a luminous quality that is unique in its immediacy and movement, its transparency and purity," she said. "The colors can be ever so subtle or extremely bold and powerful. They blend and flow into each other, sometimes in unexpected ways."

When Emily Stewart was 14 years old, her family moved

from her childhood home in Vermont to Thailand because her father took a job there. The move was supposed to be for one year, but stretched into five, and when the family returned to the United States it was time for Stewart to go to college.

She attended Macalester College in Minnesota, and whenever people asked where she was from she didn't know how to respond. She felt a loss of place, she said, which has in turn become the pivotal inspiration for all of her works.

Stewart's artwork, reminiscent of the places she has come to know, maps out areas in which she lived and worked: El Camino Real, the Bay Area and beyond. Most prominently on display are "Home Blueprint 1 and 2," which depict her life as she remembers it at her Vermont home. "Blueprint 1" offers the warm reds, oranges, yellows and greens of her childhood, while "Blueprint 2" reflects a cooler attitude, with more blues and grays depicting the home her family returned to when she went to college.

"Like scraps of memories, I collage pieces of fabric together to create a representation of home," Stewart said. "The scaled-down nature of maps forces me to work abstractly, prioritizing and symbolizing my recollections."

These "maps," made mostly of cloth, are collaged together using "fabric that I transform through repeated applications of dye, bleach and silk-screened elements," she said. ▀

CASE STUDY OF THE WEEK

"Me...? With scoliosis??"

How can that be???"

These are the words that came out when Jan saw her X-rays. She saw a 21 degree bend in her lower back, and had no idea that she was that bent, or that her constantly recurring lower back and hip pain were caused by the discs being crushed and deformed by her scoliosis.

Scoliosis is usually associated with a deformity that evokes images of the "Hunchback of Notre Dame", but, like so many things, it is a matter of degree. When a scoliosis is first starting in a youngster, 4 degrees is significant. It predicts serious impact upon her health.

At age 20, a 21 degree angle may not sound so serious. But, since a scoliosis increases, on average, at the rate of 1 degree per year, 30 years later we have a very serious problem that could be irreversible.

Fortunately, we have some new technologies that enable us to deal effectively with many of the scoliosis conditions that were previously afforded only temporary relief.

For Jan, her scoliosis angle reduced from 21 degrees to 9 degrees in 4 months, the equivalent of reversing 12 years of degenerative changes.

Check your spine, and check your child's spine, while it is reversible.

Imagine if all of diverse MOUNTAIN VIEW talked about ONE BOOK and its ideas for an entire month.

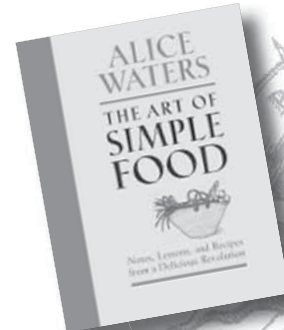

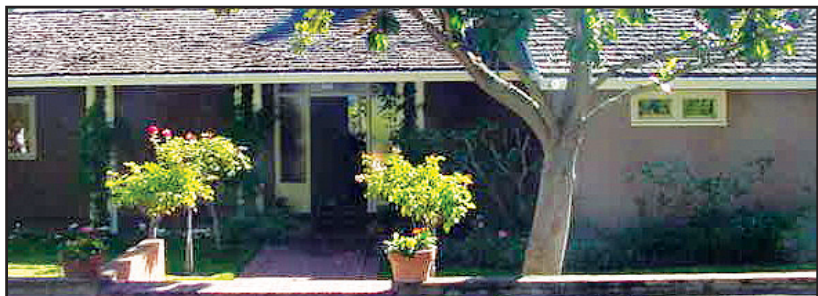

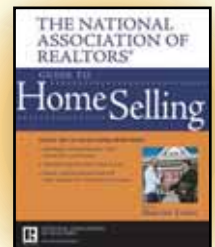
