MOMA is on the move. Just as the Palo Alto Art Center did two years ago, the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art has closed for renovations and is taking its art on the road. While hammers bang away on the museum's expansion project through early 2016, SFMOMA is sending traveling exhibitions, outdoor art and new commissioned works around the Bay Area.

This month, two of those endeavors come to the Midpeninsula. Starting Thursday, Nov. 13, Stanford's Cantor Arts Center is hosting "Flesh and Metal: Body and Machine in Early 20th-Century Art," an exhibition of about 70 works from SFMOMA's collection. The paintings, photos, sculptures, drawings, prints and illustrated books are examples of how artists in

looked at issues of mechanization and humanity between the 1910s and the early '50s.

Art also hits the streets in downtown Los Altos, where "Project Los Altos: SFMOMA in Silicon Valley" brings works by nine contemporary artists to 10 indoor and outdoor spots beginning this Saturday. Much of the art was created as site-specific responses to the character of the downtown; other pieces were already in existence. The unusual endeavor explores Los Altos' evolution over the decades from an orchard-filled village to a boutique-filled downtown that is very much immersed in tech culture.

Video is a major element of the project, including the "Winchester" video trilogy by the late artist Jeremy Blake, which examines the odd history of the Winchester Mystery House with the aid of vintage ads and photos. The piece is on view at 242 State St.

Los Angeles artist Mike Mills also uses video in his three-part work "A Mind For-



ever Voyaging Through Strange Seas of Thought Alone: Silicon Valley Project" (the title quotes the Isaac Newton quotation used in Apple Computer's first logo). The work combines the past, present and future, reaching back to incorporate the documents from Apple's formation and looking ahead with video interviews with kids whose parents work in high-tech. The work can be seen at 169 State St.

Chicago artist Jessica Stockholder took the call to bring art to the streets of Los Altos seriously. In "Cross Hatch," she gave her artist's interpretation of a specific intersection: the place where Fourth and State streets meet. She overlaid a Google Earth image with a geometric drawing that looks like a crazy quilt of farm fields, if farmers typically grew crops of orange, purple and black. Then she painted her drawing directly onto the pavement at said intersection. Passers-by can stand and look, or perch on bleachers set up for the installation.

"She's transformed the intersection with color and form," said Jenny Gheith, assistant curator of painting and sculpture at SFMOMA. "People walk through it. They become part of that composition."

Another artist hopes to meet up with Los Altos he knew decades ago. Charles Garioian's project looks back at the performance art he did with students while teaching art at Los Altos High School from 1969 to 1986. Photos on display at 359 State St. show some of the projects, including "Watermelon Sculpture" (1972), in which students arranged melons and then carefully cut them smaller and smaller to see the shapes that emerged. "Some of his students went on to be artists or art historians," Gheith said.

As viewers wander through and observe, seeing their familiar downtown in a new way, the more traditional "Flesh and Metal" exhibition will be at the Cantor through March 16. Artists represented include Salvador Dali, Margaret Bourke-White, Marcel Duchamp, Piet Mondrian and Man Ray.

The man-and-machine theme flourished in art in the early years of the 20th century as artists looked at the ways that industrialization helped and harmed society. Was the machine world sleekly efficient, to be praised for helping poor laborers advance, or did it sap the warmth of human society? How did mechanization affect creativity?

These questions and others are explored.

As part of the collaboration between the Cantor and SFMOMA, Stanford students helped design the exhibition in a class taught by Stanford's Hilarie Faberman and Nancy J. Troy, two of the show's curators. They will talk about the experience in a panel discussion on Nov. 13 at 4:30 p.m. in the museum auditorium.

Several other free events are also planned. At 5:30 p.m. Nov. 14, University of Chicago art history professor Wu Hung will speak at Stanford's Annenberg Auditorium on ritual, social member and political discourses and how they relate to visual forms. Stanford arts and humanities professor Alexander Nemerov will speak at 5:30 Nov. 21 in the Cantor auditorium on the links between John F. Kennedy and the Thomas Eakin painting "Swimming." Later talks and a poetry reading are also planned. ▀

Stockholder has transformed intersections before. In 2011, her "Color Jam" did the same for a crossroads in downtown Chicago. She said in an artist's statement, "The corner is canvas, stage, pedestal and frame against which the public can view a parade of shifting color relationships."

Other media in "Project Los Altos" include photography, painting and inflatable sculpture. All of the curatorial departments at SFMOMA took part in choosing the artists, Gheith said. The artists spent as much time in Los Altos as was practical, getting to know the area.

The person who came from the farthest away is spending the most time here. Katerina Seda, a Czech artist, is creating a collaborative work called "Everything Is Perfect": a sort of local "Guinness Book of World Records" to spotlight local accomplishments — but the everyday ones. As the artist puts it on her website, everythingisperfect.org: "Do you think you have the longest beard in Los Altos or Los Altos Hills? Send in an application!"

Seda has spent time walking downtown and will be around again for three weeks getting to know people in the community, Gheith said.

NEW SCOOP MICROCREAMERY MAKES SMALL-BATCH ICE CREAM WITH LIQUID NITROGEN

NO ICE FOR THIS ICE CREAM

Yet another ice cream shop in Palo Alto? It's a crowded field, but it would be wrong to dismiss Scoop Microcreamery, a small-batch, mom-and-pop ice cream shop that opened on University Avenue in late September.

Scoop is owned by Dave and Cindy Somasunderam, New Jersey transplants who clearly love making ice cream.

Cindy, who has been making ice cream at home for years, makes two flavors of her own vanilla extract (classic and bourbon vanilla). The pair use home-grown herbs to make their sorbets. And she refers to herself and her husband as "Mr. and Mrs. Scoop."

But Scoop is not conventional. With two giant tanks of liquid nitrogen on hand, the folks at Scoop make all their ice cream throughout the day, freezing it on-site in small batches at minus-321 degrees Fahrenheit. This method of making ice cream is gaining popularity in the Bay Area because it creates a product that is said to be denser, creamier and more flavorful than traditionally churned ice cream.

The couple got the idea from an episode of "Shark Tank," an ABC television show that searches for unique businesses. One episode featured Sub Zero Ice Cream and Yogurt, a Utah-based franchise that uses nitrogen to make made-to-order frozen treats.

"My husband said, 'We gotta do something like this,'" Cindy said. "But we didn't want to do one serving at a time, because we don't want people to have to wait for it. We also want people to be able to taste it. We wanted to do it not just for the novelty of having it made to order, but to make really good ice cream."

Their daughter, a scientist, got them some liquid nitrogen to play around with.

"Cindy whipped up some of her ice cream recipes and we froze it with the nitrogen," Dave said. "It was amazing, and at that point we knew we wanted to combine the best ingredients with the best ice cream technology."

The two shuttered their frozen-yogurt shop in New Jersey and moved to the Bay Area a few years ago, making the final move to Palo Alto this summer. They've taken over a space in downtown Palo Alto that used to house Haagen Dazs, adding personal touches along with two giant metal tanks of nitrogen behind the counter.

Cindy said that they blend all their ingredients — starting with Strauss Family Creamery organic cream, eggs and sugar — in advance, so the ingredients are

ready to be frozen. Ingredients are poured into a bowl that resembles a KitchenAid mixer that's hooked up via a hose to the nitrogen tanks. As the nitrogen does its job, what looks like dry-ice vapor envelops the area surrounding the bowl. It takes approximately five minutes to

make a batch of ice cream.

"It's nice because it's freezing it so fast, it doesn't have time for the ice crystals to form," she said. "Conventional methods of churning are a little slower. With nitrogen, there's no air pumped into it so it's creamy and dense. It really is a beautiful, velvety texture."

Dave said they make numer-

ous "tiny" batches of each flavor throughout the day. Nothing is carried over from one day to the next in order to preserve freshness — one of Scoop's main commitments.

"We try to do everything the best quality possible," Cindy said. "We're not a big space but we're trying to do as much from scratch as we can."

Cindy's homemade vanilla extract, made from Madagascar vanilla beans, goes into Scoop's classic vanilla bean and chocolate. Her other extract, made with bourbon, makes what she said is their most popular flavor, vanilla bourbon with salted caramel.

It costs \$4.50 for one scoop, up to \$5.75 for three scoops. Flavors vary from day to day. They include mint with brownies (made with real peppermint oil), maple bacon crunch (so popular they started selling the crunch concoction, similar to bacon

brittle, on its own), pumpkin with ginger streusel, dark chocolate, dark roast coffee, saffron and "hella Nutella," a play on the Northern California slang word.

Vegan options come in the form of sorbets, including strawberry-peach balsamic, raspberry-hibiscus and chili-mango.

The chili-mango sorbet drew Jennifer Real, a Fremont native who works at Stanford University, into Scoop on a recent afternoon. "I saw this interesting flavor — chili-mango sorbet — and tried it. I think it's amazing, but I

wasn't in the mood for mango."

So she left with a single scoop of Biscoff cookies n' cream (made with Biscoff cookies and Biscoff spread).

"It's very light and not sweet at all," she said. "It's very subtle in flavor but not as creamy as regular ice cream."

Real didn't opt for any toppings, but Scoop offers quite a few: Cindy's homemade brown sugar caramel sauce; hot fudge; a drizzle of honey, maple syrup or olive oil; whipped cream; Nutella or a chocolate shell.

There are also almonds, carob coconut clusters, toasted coconut, peanuts, roasted cashews, "cornflakes n' milk crunch" (from Mrs. Scoop's secret recipe) and chocolate toffee almonds.

And there's more. Create a sundae for \$6.95 or a "fruit twister," essentially a smoothie, for \$6.25. The milkshakes — chocolate, vanilla, coffee or avocado for \$6.25 — are touted on the menu board with this slogan: "The best ice cream makes the best shakes."

MOVIE REVIEWS

12 YEARS A SLAVE

★★★★ 1/2

It can be hard to see the tree for the forest when it comes to films about culturally loaded topics, none more so than American slavery. It's useful to keep in mind that "12 Years a Slave" is the story of a man: another tale of physical and emotional survival that, unlike "All is Lost" and "Gravity," derives from a true story. The man is Solomon Northup, who endured the titular torture before penning his autobiography of the same name (as told to white lawyer David Wilson). Director Steve McQueen's cinematic adaptation, scripted by John Ridley, begins in 1841, where free New York resident Northup (Chiwetel Ejiofor), a husband and father, entertains an offer to play the violin on tour with a circus. The offer turns out to be a ruse, and Northup is kidnapped, transported by a domestic slave ship to New Orleans, and sold into slavery. As such, and above all, "12 Years a Slave" explores one man's terrifying realization of the fragility of his existence and, accordingly, his sense of self. *Rated R for violence/cruelty, some nudity and brief sexuality. Two hours, 13 minutes.* — P.C.

ABOUT TIME ★★

The congenial voiceover at the beginning of writer-director Richard Curtis' comedy promises an entertaining glimpse at a "fairly odd family, too skinny, too orange." But their thin frames and ginger-colored hair aren't particularly memorable, nor is the narrator's fairly ordinary life that unfurls in a leisurely manner. As in Curtis' "Four Weddings and a Funeral" and "Notting Hill," the characters are familiar British types with Bill Nighy ("The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel") playing the laid-back family patriarch and Domhnall Gleeson ("Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows") assuming the role of his affable son. LAST VEGAS ★★ ★

At first glance, "Last Vegas" seems a bit like "The Hangover" for the 60-and-over crowd (minus the raunch). But the class-act cast and a solid script from screenwriter Dan Fogelman ("Crazy, Stupid, Love.") keep the film fresh, funny and thoroughly entertaining. The story follows four childhood friends as they reunite in Las Vegas for the wedding of one of their own. Billy (Michael Douglas) is a wealthy charmer set to marry a woman more than 30 years his junior. Sam (Kevin Kline, in top form) is a Florida retiree struggling to rediscover the passion in his 40-year marriage. Air Force vet Archie (Morgan Freeman) has grown weary of his son's cautious care. 
